Where do we go from here?

Whilst there is a great deal to feel positive about in terms of the Churches' responses to the prevailing social and economic situations across the country there is an abidingly uncomfortable feeling that things are by no means improving, but rather continue to grow much worse for more families and individuals. Alison Webster reports 31,000 people died unnecessarily in the UK last winter, 10,000 of these deaths due to cold homes and fuel poverty (Webster, the Door January 2015 p11). Being cold for prolonged periods seriously thwarts child thriving, health and development, sometimes with permanent consequences.

It is deeply heartening that the churches, including in our own community, quietly and with immense commitment make voluntary provision - to a highly efficient and effective standard - by provision of Foodbanks for example. However, many of the accounts one hears about Benefit Sanctions and cuts are frankly cruel. Volunteers, shocked by the accounts of people's experience, circumstances, and the desperation with which they have had to seek help, also challenge our political leaders and policy makers about the causes. Clearly Foodbanks, and other voluntary projects, are a colossal lifeline - not only for their efficiency, and the 'professionalism' with which they are organised, but they have the merit of being corporately organised by the community for the community. But these measures, vital though they are, do not and cannot address the fundamental and long-term needs for everyone to have secure living wages, decent housing, underpinned by the strong safety net of reliable state benefits. This is beyond the scope and capacity of voluntary agencies with volunteers - however skilled and generous they are.

So what is to be done – when people turn to us in emergencies, out-of-hours, which is when crises tend to occur? Recourse to emergency help from the statutory sector, in personal experience, seems simply a figment of optimistic imaginations. Those on the 'front desk' may be over bound with bureaucratic red tape, weary operatives, or simply hugely overworked themselves. No one is to blame. Yet we all are responsible. DO we simply give financial handouts, which can be very undignified for individuals, and be patronising on our part. Surely that is what taxes are for, isn't it? And why



no person should have to undergo the indignity of going cap-in-hand to another unto whom he or she may feel unduly beholden. This is neither just nor human, and is a far cry from what our forefathers and foremothers, not least William Temple and Beveridge strived for together all those years ago.

Is there a return to the Cathy Come Home scenario, whereby parents live in genuine fear their children be removed from them if the gas and electricity services are cut off? If such a fear is well founded, then such a situation is utterly outrageous and totally unacceptable. Inadequate housing, unjust sanctions, and insufficient wages to feed and equip families are no less than institutionalised child abuse.

For those who may question the 'spirituality' of this article, I would respond simply by saying: we are the body of Christ, and also are all God's people, aren't we? So where do we go from here?

Women's World Day of Prayer 2015

On **Friday 6 March** the annual World Day of Prayer Service will take place at the **Methodist Church in Rose Street at 2pm**.

World Day of Prayer is a global, ecumenical movement of Christian women joined together to observe a common day of prayer each year on the first Friday of March. Their motto of "Informed prayer and prayerful action" signifies that prayer and action are inseparable.

This year the service has been written by Christian women in The Bahamas with the theme 'Jesus said to them: 'Do you know what I have done to you?'" This year The Bahamas Committee did not include a formal address and the service will flow naturally, telling us about the islands which make up this country, and about their people. It will include a short period of quiet reflection and sharing.

The Bahamas is a place of beauty. The beautiful colours gifted by nature are reflected in the worship service and the artwork. The islands give voice to the people of The Bahamas who invite the world to "come and be washed in God's everflowing ocean of grace: to bask in the iridescent light of Christ's love, and to be embraced by [God's] Holy Spirit with the cooling trade-winds of transformation."

Radical love is the theme that weaves together all the components of the worship resources. They eloquently tell us that Jesus is God's presence of radical love in the world. Following Jesus' example of washing his disciple's feet, we are asked to continue the gesture of love in The Bahamas and in our own communities. That is how the spiral of informed prayer and prayerful action moves around the globe.

As we listen to our Bahamian sisters throughout the worship service, we realize that transformation is seen when a teen mother does not feel alone as she finds support to continue her education and to raise her child, when a breast cancer survivor or people living with HIV and AIDS find strength to live out their journey, and when the chains of oppression and enslavement are broken. Also, let's not forget the call for responsible stewardship of God's creation shared by all; whether it is those who step in the pink sand or swim in turquoise water of the archipelago, or those who enjoy whatever natural beauty has been gifted by God to your corner of the world.

All the churches in Wokingham are represented at this ecumenical service, which will be followed by refreshments served in The Meeting Place, which is the cafe area of The Bradbury Community Centre. Do please join us.

Everyone is welcome, not just ladies!

EXPLANATION OF GOD - a child's view:

'One of God's main jobs is making people. He makes them to replace the ones that die, so there will be enough people to take care of things on earth. He doesn't make grownups, just babies; I think because they are smaller and easier to make. That way he doesn't have to take up his valuable time teaching them to talk and walk. He can just leave that to mothers and fathers.'

'God's second most important job is listening to prayers. An awful lot of this goes on, since some people, like preachers and things, pray at times beside bedtime. God doesn't have time to listen to the radio or TV because of this. Because he hears everything, there must be a terrible lot of noise in his ears, unless he has thought of a way to turn it off.'

'God sees everything and hears everything and is everywhere which keeps Him pretty busy. So you shouldn't go wasting his time by going over your mum and dad's head asking for something they said you couldn't have.'





Fairtrade Fortnight 2015

Fairtrade Fortnight is coming - 23 February - 8 March 2015! We've come so far since the first Fairtrade Fortnight in 1995, educating the public on why to choose Fairtrade and increasing sales on Fairtrade terms for marginalised producers. Over the

past 20 years, together we've made the Fairtrade mark the biggest and best known ethical label in the UK.

78% of the UK public recognise the FAIRTRADE Mark.

From UK sales alone, £26m of Fairtrade Premium was invested by producers in 2013.

But we know there is still a long way to go to make all trade fair – just 1.2% of cocoa and less than 10% of tea globally is traded on Fairtrade terms.

So for Fairtrade Fortnight 2015, we're going to celebrate the impact of Fairtrade and ask you to turn a spotlight on the producers who grow the products we love. By sharing their stories in a fresh and compelling way, we can remind the UK of the dramatic difference choosing Fairtrade makes and how much it is still needed. We're focusing on a few core commodities – cocoa, sugar, and tea – in new materials, case studies and a brand new 15 minute film that will be available for Fairtrade Fortnight.

Whether you're an individual or part of a Fairtrade group, there will be opportunities to take action – including asking businesses directly to switch to Fairtrade in a "Stock it" challenge.

Albert Guébré, a Fairtrade cocoa farmer from the Côte d'Ivoire says: "Cocoa enables me to educate my children - the co-operative helps us with schooling loans at the beginning of the school year. Now that I have grandchildren, more sales of Fairtrade cocoa would enable me to better support my family." For fellow Côte d'Ivoire cocoa farmer Traore Issouf, part of the ECOOKIM co-operative, it means benefitting from a stable income and a business he and other co-operative members can invest in improving;

"There's happiness in the co-operative! Before we didn't earn enough. Now when I get ill, the co-op looks after me. We have learnt to do pruning and to maintain our cocoa trees and now we get a better harvest:

WE HARVEST GOOD QUALITY COCOA SO THAT CONSUMERS CAN EAT GOOD CHOCOLATE."



Wokingham Borough Fairtrade Churches network.

This group was an offshoot of the Wokingham Fairtrade Campaign and has continued to meet twice a year in January and July to share information and ideas about the promotion of issues of fair trade and social justice in those of our local churches which have Fairtrade status. It has had active support from representatives from Wargrave, Park URC (in Reading), Finchampstead, Earley and Wokingham as well as here at Woosehill.

As a reminder, to achieve Fairtrade status, the Church Council at Woosehill had to agree to:

- Use Fairtrade tea and coffee after services and in all meetings for which we have responsibility
- Move forward on using other Fairtrade products such as sugar, biscuits and fruit.
- Promote Fairtrade during Fairtrade Fortnight and during the year through events, worship and other activities whenever possible.

During this time, we have moved onto excellent Fairtrade REAL coffee, which is much appreciated by church family, Tadpoles and visitors. Our Tadpoles group also always uses Fairtrade bananas, in spite of difficulties sourcing them at Morrisons (please keep asking for them!).

Over the years we have shared magazine articles, lobbied Primark following the Rana Plaze fire in Bangladesh and shared information on new Fairtrade products as well as initiatives in our own churches. It has been a very supportive group, with interesting and encouraging meetings and I have valued being a member of it. At our last meeting on January 15th the group decided that, due to changes in the circumstances of several of its members we would no longer meet face to face but would continue to exchange information and ideas as a "virtual group." Also, after a good number of years of being our Fairtrade champion I have decided to stand down from running our Fairtrade stall with effect from July. I will continue to be a passionate supporter of Fairtrade and social justice and to be a member of the online group.

It would be good to remember our Fairtrade status especially during Fairtrade Fortnight, this year from 23 Feb - 8 March and especially during our prayers of intercession at this time. There are resources on the Traidcraft and Fairtrade Foundation websites.

We hear in church on Sunday about God's heart for the poor and His love of justice. We are also called to put our faith into action throughout the rest of the week.




James 2: 14-17:

In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.




Knitting news - a message from Melanie
